9TH INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM ON AGGLOMERATION 2009

This event will be held June 22-26, 2009, at Sheffield, UK, with a two-day granulation course on June 22, 23 and the actual symposium on June 24, 25 and 26. The announcement was issued by the University of Sheffield (simon.butler@sheffield.ac.uk/content/1/c6/09/13/57/All_abstracts.pdf

The first ever International Symposium was held in 1961 in Philadelphia, PA, USA.

141 accepted abstracts is an impressive number and this promises to become a popular agglomeration event. Past symposia have been held in several different countries (Germany, France, UK, Thailand, Japan come to mind as well as USA and Canada).

There was a time, when IBA was somewhat concerned, when the IBA Conference fell into the same year as this international event. One time, when I was involved with the symposia and also assisted in planning the IBA event, we managed to contact the symposia event planners, who at the time agreed to refer nonselected abstracts to IBA. We actually picked up several papers that way, all good topics and of interest to IBA participants.

This annual PBE index appeared in the December 08 issue. The agglomeration section lists 3 case histories, 2 custom processor articles, 2 on new installations, 5 on test centers and 44 technical articles, including 15 agglomeration advisor columns from 2001 to 2008. TABLES & CAPSULES, NOV. 2008

PBE's sister publication for the pharmaceutical sector (Buyer's Guide) has a listing for agglomeration equipment, by category, e.g. encapsulator, extruder, fluid bed, granulator, mixing agglomerator, pastillator, roller (i.e. roll compactor), rotary fluid bed, spherodizer and spray. Tablet presses are listed as a separate category, almost 3 pages. Another listing of T&C, of interest to agglomeration practitioners is "excipients", with a sub-category of "binders."

COAL AGE, OCTOBER 2008

There are 11 US states with coal preparation (cleaning) plants, with the highest number in Kentucky and West Virginia, 73 and 70 respectively, of a total of 275 prep plants. Leaders in this field are CONSOL Energy, Massey Energy, Patriot Coal, Peabody Energy, Alpha Natural Resources, International Coal Group and James River Coal.

The conference and exhibition serving this market has just been announced, International Coal Prep 2009, April 27-30, Lexington, KY, with approximately 180 exhibits and a 3 ½-day conference program.

MORE COAL AGE, NOVEMBER 2008

This issue brings a comprehensive review of one of the largest and most important international mining shows, sponsored by National Mining Association, held last year in September at Las Vegas, NV. This is held every 4 years. 2008 featured almost 1300 exhibitors. Attendance was said to be 44% higher thant 4 years ago. RECOMMENDED MATERIAL

Two topics dealing with mixing and blending, in two publications:

- Mixing and Blending, Selecting Solids Mixers: Factors to Consider, Peter van der Wel, Tablets & Capsules, July 2008
- Mixer and Blender Capabilities Chart, PBE, January 2009, pp. 74-81 covering 32 manufacturers and multiple mixer types. This is a helpful guide, when doing early comparisons of capabilities, methods, materials handled, capacities, etc.

In the same PBE issue, pp 82-87 is an article on a contract manufacturer (tolling) producing granules, tablets, briquets, as the article title explains, in addition to other processing and packaging steps.

For some one looking for a way to develop a new product without early investment in a permanent plant, or off-site processing, especially involving agglomeration, this article is recommended. One often repeated question this writer gets from the field is "Where can I get "x" 100's of pounds of "x" tons of my material toll processed?" Here is a least one good answer.

Interested in plastics co-extrusion and compounding? Another article in PBE January 2009, pp. 104-109, "Feeders provide highly accurate repeatable feedrates." It is about feeders, but also about thermoplastics/resins contract processing.

The 2009 31st Biennial Conference, September 27-30, 2009

IBA Workshop/Training Session

The Sunday afternoon Agglomeration Workshop was a huge success at the 2007 conference. The half-day seminar in 2009 will be "Particle Size Enlargement through Agglomeration: Methods and Practices". The Workshop will include topics such as briquetting, compacting, pelletizing, granulation, extrusion, spray-drying/granulation and tabletting. Additional topics will include binders and methods for measuring the quality of agglomerates. The workshop is designed to give the participant a good preparation for the technical conference. The Board of Directors will be meeting in late April and at that time more information will be available. Early registration fee is \$400, but after August 1, 2009, it will be \$500.

We have had successful Vendor Nights the last few conferences. Last year there were nine different companies/universities that presented their product line in a tabletop fashion. Vendor Night will take place on Sunday, September 27 following the workshop.
